

## Sanctuary Window Update



On December 10, 2023, this congregation voted to replace the Jefferson name on the window closest to the pulpit with that of **Frances Ellen Watkins Harper**. On August 20, 2023, Rev. Colin Bossen, a visiting UU minister, offered us a sermon on her legacy. In it, we learned something of her

story, and her work as an abolitionist and advocate for women's rights. Having her join the other significant leaders in our evolving faith lifts up the contributions of people of color (POC) and our ongoing commitment to living our values.

You won't see Watkins Harper's name up there right away. The window names are painted andwhile a re-do seems like a relatively simple project, the leading on all the windows, especially the west-facing ones, needs to be replaced before any work can be done. (We will also need to determine just which combination of her names to use.

In the meantime, we will be working on a written history of how we came to this renaming - why we embarked upon it and how the process evolved - and where to preserve and commemorate it.

Julia's office (also in the hallway left of the kitchen), or mailed to USSB, Attn.: COSM.

Issues are discussed at a monthly COSM meeting and, where appropriate, shared with other USSB leadership, whether individuals, committees, or the Board of Trustees. (Note: COSM receives communications with regard to our Covenant of Healthy Relationships which are confidential and limited to the parties involved.)

And finally, there is a link to the monthly agenda of the **Board of Trustees** meeting in the weekly email the Friday <u>before</u> the meeting. If you see an item you'd like to comment upon, there is an Open Forum time at the beginning of the meeting where you can speak. Or if you'd just like to hear the discussion, you are welcome to listen to any part of the meeting except Executive session (infrequent) as an observer.

#### Black Women Leaders from Slavery to Today

Presented by Dr. Daina Ramey Berry
The Michael Douglas Dean of Humanities and Fine Arts
at University of California Santa Barbara

Join us for a very special evening as we kick off our 2024 Contemporary Issues Forum Winter series with Dr. Daina Ramey Berry, an internationally recognized scholar on



gender and slavery, and Black women history. Her most recent book, A Black Women's History of the United States, co-authored with Kali Nicole Gross, is an empowering testament of Black women's ability to build communities in the face of oppression, and their continued resistance to systemic racism and sexism.

Dr. Berry was recently appointed as the Michael Douglas Dean of Humanities and Fine Arts at UCSB following a nationwide search. She has authored and edited six award-winning books and has been featured on PBS NewsHour, NBC, TLC, MSNBC, CNN, C-SPAN, National Geographic Explorer, and NPR. Her work has also been featured in The New York Times, Time, Newsweek, U.S. News & World Report, The Washington Post, and Huffington Post.

Before joining UCSB she was the Oliver H. Racket regents Professor of History and Chair of the History Department at the University of Texas, Austin. Professor Berry completed her BA, MA, and PhD in African American Studies and U.S. History at the University of California Los Angeles.

Dr. Berry's <u>press kit</u> demonstrates the breadth of her many contributions to the study of slavery and the multitudes of its impact upon our history and contemporary culture. Her upcoming presentation on the impact and importance of the Black women today will be a defining event for the CIF program, and an important contribution to the congregation and broader community.

#### The New Realities of Recycling in Santa Barbara County

Most of us like to recycle. It is something that is relatively easy to do and it makes us feel good about doing our part to keep our planet clean and its ecosystems healthy. But there is more to recycling than most of us know, and, on top of that, recycling in Santa Barbara has changed. The good news is that there are many more items that can be recycled in our county - carpets, DVD's and CD's, tires, cooking oil, etc - but they cannot go in the blue bins. The bad news is that there are even fewer things that we can put in our blue bins.

First, let's address some common misconceptions. Santa Barbara County does not actually recycle anything (other than green waste). The County contracts with Marborg to collect potentially recyclable materials (plastics, glass, metals, etc.) which are then sold to various companies that engage in the true recycling process. The companies that actually do the recycling are usually not located in the US. The items to be processed must be bundled and shipped to these various locales where they are physically and/or chemically broken down and reformulated into 'recycled' products.

Virtually everything that goes into our blue bins gets shipped out of the country for processing. While we tend to think of recycling as a clean endeavor, the plastic bottle you put in your blue bin must be picked up by the trash men driving fossil-fuel-burning trucks, driven to the landfill, put on plastic-wrapped pallets, then shipped overseas in fossil-fuel-burning ships. All those fossil fuels further warm our planet.

Second, the triangular recycling logo we are all so familiar with... 3 arrows surrounding a number from 1 to 7... is very misleading. It seems to indicate that any plastic that displays that logo can be recycled.

Cont. The truth is that, in Santa Barbara County, only clean plastics with 1's and 2's are accepted in the blue bins. There are currently no markets for selling any of the 3 through 7 plastics, so items displaying the numbers 3 through 7 must go in the trash, not the recycle bins. And from your trash can, they go into the landfill at Tajiguas. Any plastic containers you purchase that are not 1's or 2's get driven to Tajiguas and buried in the ground. Deli containers, most restaurant take-out containers, cottage cheese and single-serving yoghurt containers, the packaging for prepackaged produce, dried fruit & nuts, etc. end up in our landfill.

After all that negative information we have some good news to share. About a dozen of us UU's visited the ReSource center at the Tajiguas Landfill a couple of months ago for a very informative tour. We will be scheduling another trip in January. If you would like to attend, visit our courtyard table next month to sign up or contact Arianna Jansma.

Mark your calendars! The Earth Advocates will be sponsoring a presentation on February 4th in Parish Hall after the Sunday service. Hillary Allen from the Santa Barbara Department of Sustainability and Resilience will debunk common myths about recycling and enlighten us regarding the new rules for recycling in SB County.

# Outreach Offerings The Congregation Component

One of the great joys of being a part of the USSB community is the opportunity to make concrete contributions to the good work of special projects and organizations that reflect and further our values in the world. Each week our congregation donates 25% of the Sunday plate collection to one of these special groups.

We support a different recipient each month, with several of the slots set aside for organizations we have committed to supporting on a permanent basis (UU Justice Ministry of California, LGBTQ Partners, Hunt for Justice), while recipients for the remaining months often respond to an immediate need or action. Not everyone knows, however, that the congregation directly nominates and votes on recipients for three months of the year. The chosen recipients are in place for 2 years, in this case, March, April, and May of 2024 and 2025.

The nominations process is simple and straightforward. It starts with thinking about projects or organizations you might like to nominate. These can be new recipients or groups we have supported in the past. Once you have identified a possible recipient, you need to submit the following:

- 1. Name of nominator (that's you!)
- 2. Nominator's contact info. (email, phone) in case of questions
- 3. Official name of Project or Organization you are nominating as a recipient
- 4. Project or Organization website link (URL) or, if no website, organizational contact name, phone, email address
- 5. Is it a 501(c)(3) non-profit (for informational purposes only; not required)
- 6.General focus of the organization or project in one categorical word or short phrase. For example: Environment/Climate, Voting Rights, Children's Welfare
- 7. Describe the mission/goals/focus of the organization or project. Please feel free to use text from the organization's website or other written materials).
- 8.In your own words, provide a brief statement on how this organization or project supports/enhances UU goals and specifically the mission of USSB. Why do you think your fellow congregants should select for this organization or project?

You may respond to these 8 questions by completing the form which you will find linked from the <u>Outreach Offertory page</u> on the USSB website. Paper nomination forms will also be available in the garden starting in early January and voting will commence on February 1. Further information about the voting process will be forthcoming

# JANUARY OUTREACH OFFERING



Our January outreach offering will be shared with Sumi Nungwa an organization whose mission is to provide food, clothing, medical supplies, and firewood to Navajo & Hopi elders seeking to maintain their traditional lifestyle on their reservations. This is a way to build bridges between cultures and to encourage Hopi & Navajo artists to continue to produce their unique, traditional arts & crafts.

For a number of years, members of our congregation, including youth representatives, have travelled to a Hopi Reservation in Arizona on a service work trip, co-sponsored by Sumi Nungwa, the congregation, and the trip participants. A similar trip is scheduled for later this spring.

Service projects have involved roofing hogans and homes, cleaning up and recycling trash, building traditional stone bread ovens, and taking on other projects for the elders and their families. More importantly, Sumi Nungwa observes, "[Visitors] have learned about the Hopi and Navajo cultures and spent time with the people. Interacting with the Native people is as important as learning to fix a roof."
