Good News from Our 2022–23 Fiscal Year–End Finance Report

Upon calculating last fiscal year's earnings vs. what was budgeted, we had a bang-up year. Your finance committee is so happy to report what thrilled us:

- USSB broke our budgeted pledge income we received just over our budgeted \$420,000. In 2021-22 we received \$370,000 this is a \$50,000 increase in year-over-year pledging!
- Our non-pledge donations equaled \$54,000, well over our annual average
- Room use and wedding gross income was \$37,000 more than budgeted
- Art shows, Auction, and Fashion Fling fundraisers combined brought in \$35,000

As your fiscal stewards, we are so grateful for the generosity of our USSB congregants in volunteer work and donations. We look forward to carrying forward your steadfast support.



Harvest the Power: Developing Lay Leadership

Are you interested in exploring and strengthening your leadership skills? We are fortunate that we have so many committed and talented people at USSB who contribute their time, energy, and skills to creating a strong and healthy congregation. And we can always use more!

Harvest the Power is a UUA curriculum designed to identify leadership skills within a framework of intentional faith development. The program guides participants to develop leadership skills that cultivate a



"we" culture in UU congregations, with relationships and covenant at the center, rather than an "I" culture of autonomous individuals. The program helps participants recognize various leadership strengths and skills that can be useful in one's personal, community, and/or professional work activities.

Harvest the Power will be taught by Chuck Flacks, Deb Karoff, and Onolee Zwicke on six Sundays following the service. Onolee, Chuck, and Deb have significant leadership experience both professionally and at USSB. Collectively, they have participated in and conducted leadership training activities in their professional work lives and community work, served as chairs of the Board of Trustees, Nominating Committee, search committees, and many USSB worship and programming activities.

Harvest the Power will be offered on Sundays from 11:30 AM to 1:30 PM on the following dates: October 1, October 15, October 29, November 12, November 19, and December 3. All meetings are in-person and will take place in Blake Lounge.

Earth Advocates Corner

Electrify Your Life . . . Starting in Your Kitchen

One of the most important actions we can take to reduce carbon emissions is to choose 100% renewable electricity for our home, then switch to all-electric



appliances. Gas-burning appliances, including ranges and cook tops, release methane gas into the environment. The emissions they produce each year in the US are roughly equivalent to the emissions of 500,000 cars. Gas stoves also emit dangerous levels of toxic

air pollutants that can trigger health problems.

Afraid to lose the responsiveness of gas stove tops if you switch to electric?

The new electric ranges are just as responsive as gas. Consumer Reports found that electric ranges outperformed gas ranges in boiling, simmering, and broiling.

Interested in the latest electric range technology?

Induction ranges use magnetic coils to cook your food. The cooking surface remains cool to the touch. These electric alternatives heat quickly and efficiently while providing performance comparable to a gas burner. You might save up to 30% on your energy bill compared to traditional electric stove tops. However, you may need to replace some pots and pans. If you haven't had an electric range before, you also might need to do a one-time upgrade to install an electric outlet for your new range.

Non-induction smooth-top electric ranges do not heat as quickly or evenly as induction ranges, and their surfaces can be hotter. They are also less expensive, but the gap is narrowing. The surfaces of both types are easier to clean than gas ranges.

Rebates are coming!

The Inflation Reduction Act includes income-based incentives through the Home Energy Rebates program

(for households below 150% area median income). They will be available through the California Energy Commission, which expects the rebates to be available in 2024.

Not ready to make the switch yet?

Consider a portable induction cook top. These come in a variety of sizes and power levels. Instant Pots are also a great addition to your kitchen, and can be used to pressure cook, as well as also do slow cooking, rice cooking, steaming, warming, and more. Electric kettles are also a quick way to heat water.

September Outreach Offering League of Women Voters Santa Barbara

The League of Women Voters of Santa Barbara is our outreach offering recipient for September, under the "Voting Rights" umbrella.

The League is a nonpartisan, grassroots organization working to protect and expand voting rights and ensure everyone is represented in our democracy. The League empowers voters and defends democracy through advocacy, education, and litigation, at the local, state, and national levels. The Santa Barbara League was founded in 1938, just 18 years after women received the right to vote. Over the years and in the present day, the local League has counted among its members and leadership many community advocates and leaders, including many members of our own congregation.

Acknowledging that the suffrage movement did not include all — women and men of color were excluded — League volunteers work furthering diversity, equity, and inclusion in issues of local importance, such as housing, the environment, and criminal justice reform. LWVSB often collaborates with other community organizations on issues of mutual concern.

At all levels, the League is committed to "Empowering Voters and Defending Democracy." In election years, LWVSB's voter service teams are involved in registering new voters and efforts to get out the vote. They help inform voters about candidates and ballot measures by organizing forums, distributing Easy Voter Guides prepared by the State League, and collecting election information for our monthly newsletter, the Channel Voter.

The Santa Barbara League is a 501(c)(3), all-volunteer organization with membership open to everyone age 16 and older. A statement from the National League explains their mission: "We envision a democracy where every person has the right, the knowledge, and the confidence to participate. We believe in the power of women to create a more perfect democracy."
