In 2021, the state of California became the first to mandate an "ethnic studies requirement" for students in the public schools, while in states like Florida, public officials have soundly rejected similar efforts, as they've spoken against "wokeness" and "critical race theory."

MUSIC: IN SEARCH SONG LEADER & CHOIR DIRECTOR

As we prepare to say goodbye to our Music Director, Matthew Griset, later this year and we consider how to support a vibrant and inspiring music program going forward, we are going to try an experiment in staffing the music program in a slightly different way. Recognizing that Santa Barbara is an expensive place to live and that it may be difficult to find one person with all the skills we are looking for, we are considering splitting the position into two. The first is a "Song Leader" position. This person will lead the congregation in singing every Sunday and provide overall coordination for the music each week. We are looking for someone with a dynamic, inspiring presence, who can use music from our hymnals as well as bring in new ideas, and in general help us embody joy and love in our singing together. The second position is the Choir Director, someone who will focus just on working with the Chancel Choir, developing the skills of our singers to prepare beautiful and uplifting music to share with us. They will rehearse on Thursdays and lead the choir twice a month on Sunday mornings.

If we find one person with the time and talent to do both, we can combine these two jobs into one! But splitting this position into two parts might make it more likely to find people with the right skills here in town. CAPITAL CAMPAIGN: NEXT STEPS... LET'S DREAM BIG TOGETHER

In October, our Capital Campaign Consultant, Rachel Maxwell, provided a written report on her recommendations following our September Next Steps Weekend.

In her report, Rachel suggests the following "Next Steps" for our congregation:

1. Conduct a process for the full congregation to create a collective prioritized vision based in your mission

- 2. Engage with an architect to develop a realistic plan for facilities with cost estimates
- 3. Begin the Capital Campaign process
- 4. Develop a five-year strategic financial plan
- 5. Work on our Culture of Generosity

The Board has since developed a Visioning Process, which will be led by a Visioning Team throughout the fall and winter months. Keep an eye on your inbox this month for more information about this process and how you can get involved. We are ready for you to dream big and broad for this congregation and the future.

This is an exciting time to be at USSB! As Rachel concludes in her report, "The Unitarian Society of Santa Barbara is healthy and well poised to expand your impact and mission in the Santa Barbara Community. Updating your facilities to be more accessible and sustainable as well as creating more spaces for spiritual nurture will reflect your mission more fully and you know it! Now it is time for the congregation to collectively create a vision for the facility that will allow you to step into the next 150 years!"

DEEP CHANGE:

A RETREAT AT THE UNITARIAN SOCIETY OF SANTA BARBARA

Deep Change: Befriending the Unknown is a retreat to be held the weekend of November 10-12, 2023 at the Unitarian Society of Santa Barbara. The retreat is open to the public. Sessions will begin early Friday evening, continue all day Saturday and conclude Sunday afternoon. Specific times are listed below.

Many of us feel the call of Deep Change in the midst of our everyday lives, more so in recent times, as new uncertainties arise. Events and experiences that shake our sense of personal identity, as well as our view of the world, can open us to the journey of Deep Change. These may include the loss of a relationship, loss of a job, change in location, retirement, and death. But also, Deep Change can begin with no apparent reason. We may feel a sense of being lost or disoriented. These feelings are often exasperated by the unraveling of our culture and society due to examples such as divisive politics, pandemic, or climate change. So, why a person finds themselves in the journey of Deep Change can be a mystery.

In this retreat, participants may realize they have a longing for greater freedom, compassion, connection, and belonging.

While Deep Change holds great promise, it can also be quite challenging. For example, at first, we may experience a sense of emptiness, meaninglessness, something missing in ourselves or in our lives.

Understanding the 7 shifts of Deep Change and their interconnectedness can help us better comprehend, navigate, and cooperate with the unseen life-giving forces of Deep Change as we discover how these shifts can transform our experience of ourselves and our world.

The retreat will be structured as a 'Circle of Trust' in which participants may share individually and collectively, questions and experiences. Since each person's sharing is personal and private, maintaining a "safe space" and confidentiality is paramount. Participants will come away with "footholds" and supportive practices and tools.

Registration for the retreat is \$150. (Includes materials, snacks and Saturday lunch.) Some scholarships are available. No one will be kept from this program due to finances. EARTH ADVOCATES CORNER



LET'S CELEBRATE SOLAR!

Installing solar panels on our roofs not only makes good ecological sense, it makes good financial sense, as well. We can save money on utility bills, power our electric vehicles, and improve the value of our homes. If you are considering installing solar panels on your roof, here are four benefits to consider:

Benefit 1: Solar panels are increasingly affordable. Residential solar is more affordable than ever, especially with the extension of the federal residential solar tax credit. Taxpayers can claim a 30% tax credit on the cost of solar systems on their income taxes. But be sure to install before January 1, 2033, when the tax credit is set to decrease to 26%. There are also a number of different financing options to make purchasing solar systems easier and with less money upfront. The monthly amount owed on a solar loan is typically less than an average utility bill. Benefit 2: You can save money by going solar! Solar offers great potential to save money on your monthly utility bill, and with utility bills trending upward, solar is likely to remain a good money-saving option for years to come. The amount you save depends upon how much electricity you consume, the size of your solar energy system, and how much power it is able to generate. If you own an electric vehicle, you could save even more money by conveniently plugging your vehicle in at home.

Benefit 3: You can keep the lights on when the grid goes down Generating your own solar power can give you the freedom to keep the lights on if there's a disruption in power. Residential solar energy systems paired with battery storage—generally called solar-plus-storage systems—provide power regardless of the weather or the time of day without having to rely on backup power from the grid. This can be especially comforting during wildfires and other emergencies.

There are savings to be found when purchasing batteries: at least one local company recently offered a \$1,000 rebate on a Tesla battery.

Benefit 4: Solar will often increase the value of your home. Buying a solar energy system will likely increase your home's value. A <u>Berkeley National Laboratory study</u> found that solar photovoltaic panels are viewed as upgrades, just like a renovated kitchen or a finished basement, and home buyers across the country have been willing to pay a premium for a home with an average-sized solar array.

NOVEMBER OUTREACH OFFERING



The Brigid Alliance

The November recipient for our Outreach Offering, celebrating Gender Justice and Reproductive Justice, is the Brigid Alliance. https://brigidalliance.org/

The BRIGID ALLIANCE mission is to "get people to abortion care, whatever it takes." Legal barriers are just one factor that can prevent someone from accessing an abortion – particularly people struggling to make ends meet, young people, queer people, disabled people, and Black, Indigenous, and other people of color. For many Americans, the costs and logistical challenges of physically getting to an abortion provider are primary barriers to access – and only getting harder.

The Brigid Alliance supports people who must travel long distances for abortion care, working across the United States, through direct support and in collaboration with a network of partners, to arrange and fund confidential travel, lodging, childcare, and logistical assistance, closing the gap between the need for an abortion and the ability to access one and serving as a single, trusted point of contact for every step of the journey. Wherever someone needs to get to abortion care in the U.S., Brigid Alliance finds a way to get them there.

Established in 2018, the Brigid Alliance is working to make abortion access above-ground, borderless, burden-free, and accessible to all. It is the only national organization providing travel and other practical support for abortion access, and the only one that specializes in long-distance travel, the need for which is increasing. Most clients are forced to travel more than 1,000 miles and have travel costs of at least \$1,000.Together, the Alliance and its partners are filling critical gaps making abortion possible for Americans from every state. Its resources are stretched thin and face surging demand in the wake of the overturn of Roe.

The Brigid Alliance is part of an ecosystem of support organizations propping up abortion care access in this country. Unlike many of their partners, the Brigid Alliance employs full-time paid staff led by clinical social workers; this allows a level of dependable, responsive, and holistic support that would not be possible otherwise. Client coordinators have the training and resources needed to handle the more complex cases that are often sent to the Alliance.




On receipt of your gift,
